When is Qualitative Research Helpful

When there is little known about a topic

Little literature

No clear concepts

No theory

Unique setting

When there is interest in more detailed explanations than quantitative alone my may provide

When there are questions of "how" and/or "why" involved

When there is a "process" orientation to the research question

Methodologies

Qualitative Descriptive

Determines basic concepts or themes that emerge from the data

Grounded Theory

Goes beyond qualitative descriptive to develop theory be relating the concepts developed to one another, thus creating theoretical structure and understanding

Phenomenology

Helpful when one desires to best illuminate a lived experience

Ethnography

Embedding in a culture/situation to observe and note interactions. Usually for a more extended period

Data Collection

Data may be collected in various ways

Extended one on one interviews

Questionnaires

Focus groups

Observation

Narrative analysis

Data Management

There are multiple programs for managing qualitative data.

NVIVO (I am experienced with this one)

MAXQDA

QDA Miner

Transana

Several others

Data Analysis

There are many methods for analyzing data. (I use Corbin & Strauss methods, but here are other good ones, Kathy Charmaz for example)

Open Coding

Line by line analysis with the naming of concepts

Incident to incident comparison and contrast

Sorting of data into groups

As concepts or themes begin to encompass more concepts (higher level), they may be more abstractly named

Thematic or conceptual structures can be created

Axial coding – creating theory

Data Analysis (cont.)

Closed Coding

You may be trying to determine the degree to which your participants resonate with themes/concepts from your experience or from literature. You could analyze and mine your data to see if those pre-existing themes exist in your sample.
