

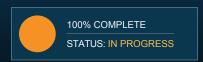

Technology is infused in all of the education courses. In the fall semester, our candidates attended an annual conference on assistive technology at the TN Access Center. Candidates complete IRIS modules related to UDL in the Diverse Learners course and UDL is taught and infused in most licensure courses. Students use Excel to graph data in their Data-bases Decision Making Projects which is required of all candidates as part of their Gateway 4. They also use easyCBM and AIMSweb. In addition, EDU 2100/5010 candidates are required to prepare a multimedia press kit on an advocacy issue. This ensures the measure of technology skills in production and presentation with their very first course in the program. Furthermore, almost all EDU courses are taught with BlackBoard as the CMS and so candidates get the skills in online access through this means.
